Mt Sturgeon Conservation visit

What a glorious day for Year 9 Animal studies to visit Mt Sturgeon conservation facility at the foot of the Grampians. This excursion was the culmination of our student led inquiry into threatened and endangered species in Victorian ecosystems.

Kai Daily, head of conservation, started the day by outlining the work that they do at Mt Sturgeon on preserving biodiversity and how it aligns with farming and agriculture. Dunkeld Pastoral covers

approximately 27,000 hectares of Southwest Victoria over several properties, growing composite prime lambs, large frame merinos and angus beef. The business has the goal to have 20% of each farm replanted to native species including wildlife corridors, shelter belts, revegetation and protection of waterways.



Mt Sturgeon has a rare and endangered native animal breeding program which we had travelled to observe. We got to meet cheeky 'Bruce' the Rufous Bettong and his new girlfriend (she is the boss) and a very cute family of five squirrel gliders who are addicted to honey.



They captively breed Fat tailed Dunnarts who have a high metabolism, who daily consume their own body weight in food and only live 15 to 17 months. These amazing carnivorous marsupials are no bigger than a mouse, go through a winter torpor (like hibernation) and are threatened by feral cat populations. Fun

fact is that they are most closely related DNA wise to the Thylacine or Tasmanian Tiger and their DNA maybe used to bring the Thylacine back from extinction.

Breeding the rare Eastern Quoll is key to their re-habitation program. On display were two quolls whose genetics are not required; however they have others that they are actively breeding to increase numbers. The quolls will ultimately be released into the properties new 96 Ha protected 'ecosystem' to further increase numbers. Quolls give birth to 20-30 babies at a time with only the first 6 to latch onto the





mother's teats surviving.

They also have an enclosure with an amazing Brush Tailed Rock Wallaby (also part of their breeding program to increase numbers) who climbs trees, Southern Brown Bandicoots and Red Recked Wallabies. Finally we were lucky enough to visit a heritage protected River Red Gum, which is estimated to be 500 to 600 years old.

Many Thanks to Mr Sawyer and Mr Pyke for accompanying us and to Kai, Brenna and Ben for hosting us and sharing their knowledge of native species of the Grampians (Geriward)
